Dear Friends of Youth,

As we review our last fiscal year, I do so with continued gratitude to the partners in our work, including our donors, supporters, volunteers, and champions. Your generosity and commitment to community have empowered youth and young adults to create new futures filled with possibility and growth. Thank you.

Among the many highlights of our work together last year was opening Iva Place Kirkland, an affordable housing community in Kirkland, Washington for young adults, ages 18 - 24, earning at or below 30%, 35%, and 50% of the Area Median Income (AMI). Iva Place Kirkland offers 15 units featuring full-size washers and dryers, access to public transit, and proximity to educational and employment opportunities. The complex is also near employers and a short drive from Lake Washington Institute of Technology. We thank our key supporters for this project, including King County, A Regional Coalition for Housing (ARCH), and the Washington Department of Commerce.

Looking ahead, we are excited about creating a new resource center for youth and young adults impacted by foster care on our Griffin campus in Renton. This new center is a key part of our purposeful efforts to develop positive supportive living environments that are sustainable for youth seeking and needing high-quality program services.


about friends of youth

new iva place kirkland

Iva Place Kirkland is an extremely energy-efficient, affordable housing community offering below market rents, with mostly single occupancy units with shared living space for income-qualified young adults, ages 18 - 24.

It is located at 11005 NE 68th Street in Kirkland, near Houghton Center and public transit.

education & employment services

Education and Employment Services focuses on providing education and employment support to young adults, ages 18 - 24, experiencing homelessness.

Services offered include individualized support surrounding education and employment development including resume development, building soft skills, exploring career opportunities, and education and/or employment placements.

willows youth services center

The Willows Youth Services Center provides Drop-In and Overnight Shelter services to clients aged 18 - 24. This cutting-edge new facility operates 24/7, including holidays.

Designed in collaboration with young adult clients of Friends of Youth, the Willows Youth Services Center offers essential amenities, including meals from a commercial kitchen, improved laundry services, semi-private sleeping areas, and access to behavioral health counseling, employment support services, and other support services to assist young people in moving from crisis to stabilization.



mental health & substance use, behavioral health counseling

In Fiscal Year 2024, we expanded our counseling services for individuals ages 4 - 24 utilizing funding from King County to introduce specialized programs.

We also expanded our shelter therapy program from our young adult shelter to our youth shelter. Our ongoing Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) program offers consistent support through weekly skills groups, complementing our outpatient counseling and prevention efforts.

Our trauma-informed, culturally responsive counseling services focus on individual and family goals. With extensive training in evidence-based practices, our counselors are committed to empowering youth to harness their strengths, guiding them toward long-term success.

our value: youth first



We consider the impact on youth in every decision we make, while utilizing the inherent strengths of the individuals and communities we serve.

housing navigation

The Housing Navigation team assists young people experiencing homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless in identifying their housing needs and options.

They work to remove barriers in the housing process and connect clients with suitable housing programs. Participants have agency and choice throughout, with a focus on a clientled, centered approach.

therapeutic foster care



households enrolled in Housing Navigation programs throughout Fiscal Year 2024 Every young person deserves the opportunity to heal, grow, and succeed.

Our trauma-informed foster homes provide a safe and supportive environment where youth can build resilience, explore their strengths, and gain the confidence to embrace life's possibilities. Tailored for youth in foster care with complex behavioral health needs, our individualized plans focus on nurturing personal growth and overcoming challenges. Through skill-building in communication, emotional regulation, substance use recovery, and independent living, we empower youth to thrive and create a brighter path forward.

supportive housing

Our Supportive Housing program offers case management support in an affordable housing complex for young adults experiencing homelessness.

Located in East King County with easy access to bus lines, schools, retail, and community centers, we provide housing stability as case managers help participants work toward their goal of self-sufficiency by reducing barriers to independent housing, increasing income, and enhancing tenancy and life skills.



rapid rehousing



The Rapid Rehousing program provides short-term rental assistance and case management services to young adults experiencing homelessness in King County.

Case managers assist participants in identifying, applying for, and renting units, and we provide move-in assistance and a step-down subsidy along with support to help participants obtain housing quickly, increase self-sufficiency, and stay housed.

KidVantage, formerly "Eastside Baby Corner," helps children have what they need to grow, play, learn, and thrive. KidVantage partners with and offers additional resources for Friends of Youth's Transitional Living Programs (TLPs), Supportive Permanent Housing (SPH, also known as Francis Village), and Rapid Rehousing for Young Families (RRHYFs). We thank you for your partnership and continuing to help build community and care for one another.

our value: relationships



Constructive relationships are essential to a fulfilled life. We seek a constructive relationship with the youth and families we serve and promote this in their lives.

transitional living services

Our Transitional Living Services provide case management and housing to single young adults and pregnant or parenting young adults and families.

New Grounds Bothell serves pregnant or parenting young parents and families ages 18 - 24 and New Grounds Sandpoint programs serve pregnant or parenting young adults ages 18 - 21. They can live in our units for up to 2 years. Our New Ground Totem Lake program serves single young adults ages 18 - 21 (ages 16 and 17 if emancipated) for up to 18 months.

All our Transitional Living Services programs provide case management support and services with the end goal of transition to permanent housing and independent living.



long-term foster care

Long-Term Foster Care supports families in creating safe, stable homes for children and youth ages 6 - 21.

The program addresses their physical, emotional, and social needs in a supportive family setting. Foster caregivers receive training and support to help youth achieve therapeutic goals and prepare for adulthood. Unaccompanied minors are referred by the Office of Refugee Resettlement, while other youth are referred by the Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families.

our value: quality



We strive to achieve the highest degree of quality in our services. One that is internally and externally validated and provided in a context of safety and confidentiality.

healthy start parent support

This year, we focused on enhancing data quality, strengthening team dynamics, and expanding community outreach.

We are committed to providing the highest standards of care in our home visiting program for pregnant and parenting families with children under six. Our dedicated home visitors offer support, resources, parenting guidance, health screenings, and connections to community services, meeting families where they are and addressing their evolving needs post-pandemic.



"I feel foster parenting is a continuation of parenting our own children. I enjoy seeing how children, even those needing more intensive therapeutic support, are so similar to our own. In one moment they are full of motivation and joy, and in the next they are trying to make peace.

I really love it when a youth opens up to me – even if I don't have anything to say, just knowing they can trust me is so valuable. I also feel it is a humbling journey, I can't boast in helping youth meet all their goals, but I get to celebrate the small steps they make toward each of their goals. - Alice Hinga, current foster parent

safe place

Safe Place is an early intervention and homelessness prevention program supporting youth in crisis, such as mental health emergencies or unsafe home situations. This program operates 24/7, with over 22,000 designated community sites nationwide.

Run by Friends of Youth in King County, we assist homeless and runaway youth ages 12 - 17 by connecting them with emergency services and shelter. In Fiscal Year 2024, Safe Place reached over 12,300 youth and trained over 1,500 adults, earning Friends of Youth recognition from National Safe Place as one of the top five agencies with the highest outreach contacts.



summer program

With summer funding from King County, we increased client participation in our mental health and substance use program by providing telehealth access with laptops and headphones, gift cards to meet basic needs, and transportation support for those unable to use telehealth.

We focused on boosting attendance and saw positive engagement with art in groups and individual sessions. This support helped sustain high engagement throughout the summer, especially for our younger clients.
